Not One Woman Less!

Strengthening EU-CELAC cooperation in the struggle against feminicide/femicide

Concept

Violence against women (VAW) and feminicide/femicide continue to be a serious public health problem, as well as one of the most complex and tenacious human rights violations both in Latin America and Europe. Due to this social pandemic, the 2013 and 2015 EU-CELAC¹ Summits resulted in the inclusion of Chapter 7 into their respective Action Plans. This chapter is entirely dedicated to guaranteeing gender equality, as well as the protection, promotion, and implementation of women's rights – one of their main aspects being the eradication of all forms of VAW. Nevertheless, despite what has been established in the aforementioned Action Plans, there are only few bi-regional initiatives carried out with regard to the fight against violence affecting women and girls. The scarce cooperative programs that are initiated by the European External Action Service (EEAS) and the EU and CELAC members in this area do neither form a coherent strategy, nor do they live up to the normative standards of the relevant regional and international treaties.

In fact, both regions are affected by international treaties that are fundamental to the eradication of violence against women and girls: The Convention on preventing and combating violence against women and domestic violence (Istanbul Convention) of the Council of Europe, the Inter-American Convention on the Prevention, Punishment, and Eradication of Violence Against Women (Belém do Pará Convention) in the Americas, and the Convention on the Elimination of all Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW) at the global level. In addition to the recommendations of the Special Rapporteur on violence against women, its causes and consequences, the above mentioned mechanisms constitute the foundation of States' obligations with regard to the fight against violence against women and girls. Hence, we understand that these international instruments should serve as the guidelines for the implementation of policies under Chapter 7.

Objectives of the Conference

The *X Conference on Feminicide/Femicide: a Global Phenomenon* will reflect upon the key challenges of the contemporary fight against VAW in which cooperation between EU and Latin America could contribute to ending VAW as well as feminicide. Taking into account the existing normative frameworks and international instruments, the conference aims to identify those actions with the highest potential for collaboration, implementation, and impact with regard to the eradication of VAW and girls in both regions. The specific objectives are the following:

- Identifying common challenges and obstacles in the implementation of the existing frameworks in both regions, especially considering the Istanbul Convention and the Belém do Pará Convention.
- Exchanging experiences on actions to prevent violence against women and girls with a focus on human rights and women's access to justice.
- Examining strategies for the appropriate training of public officials involved in cases of violence against women and girls, including police officers, judges, and prosecutors, considering the critical role of law enforcement in safeguarding women's human rights.
- Analyzing media (mis)representation of the phenomena of VAW and feminicide/femicide, as well as exploring existing projects that promote gender-sensitive news coverage on these issues.

In order to guarantee a sustainable cooperation between the EU and Latin America on the issue of violence against women and girls, the most relevant results of all of the individual issues will be further developed and outlined in the form of concrete proposals for potential projects and actions that adhere to the given framework of Chapter 7 and similar frameworks.
