Gender Equity and Sustainable Development: Prioritizing Actions to Achieve Results

Today, prospects for sustainable development remain a serious challenge as our global economy, our natural environment, our social well-being, and our political structures are in crisis. From the economy to climate change to food and agriculture, systems of governance are in disarray. More workers and their families are living in extreme poverty and the gap between the rich and the poor has grown, sparking protests around the world. Close to a billion people are hungry and the number of those malnourished is even higher. Natural disasters are occurring at an unprecedented rate and for 2012 severe drought and flooding are already predicted in a number of countries. Many of the gains made in achieving sustainable development goals over the last twenty years have been or are being reversed as downside risks to the global economy continue to materialize.

Everyone is struggling more intensely in today's world – particularly women and girls. They are the ones who work more intensely to collect water, gather wood, prepare food, provide healthcare for family members, and provide income to make ends meet when economies break down. They are more at risk of violence, contracting sexual diseases, and displacement as a result of severe weather patterns and conflict. According to the World Bank, women own 1% of world assets. They lack property rights, access to productive assets, credit, and technology. In general, they are paid less than men and have more precarious work. And so on...

The bottom line is that gender equity and sustainable development go hand in hand. Leaders recognize the importance of linking gender equity with sustainable development goals. The UN Secretary General and various UN agencies have been calling for gender equity to be cross-cutting to the MDGs and for women's meaningful participation in all decision-making processes that impact their lives. The World Bank agrees that gender equity is a core development objective in its own right. Various actors in the private sector are promoting stronger

gender initiatives in sustainable market development. Scientists and engineers are developing various technologies designed to improve the lives of women. The UNDP 2011 Human Development Report affirms that beyond the Millennium Development Goals, the world needs a post-2015 development framework that reflects equity and sustainability. The question for us now is: how can we make it happen?
